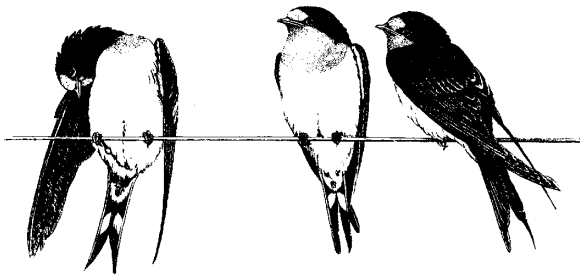


Bird Care & Conservation Society South Australia Inc

Bird Care and Conservation Society South Australia Inc

The Bird Care and Conservation Society is a voluntary organisation concerned with the welfare of wild and domestic birds.

The Society provides a service for the treatment of sick, injured and orphaned birds, educates the public in ways of caring for birds in need and assists in their conservation in the wild. This is done through a telephone advisory service (for nearest BCCS member consult the Telstra White Pages for phone numbers) and a quarterly magazine which is free to members and available to the public at a small cost. The magazine presents a wide variety of articles on topics such as bird identification, diagnosis of avian disease, bird nutrition, aviculture, environmental conservation and animal welfare issues. BCCS also publish a book "Caring for Rescued Birds" available by contacting the Society, or from the website.

The Society's close working relationship with the RSPCA, the Conservation Council of SA, National Parks and Wildlife Service and the Australian Bird and Bat Banding Scheme provides it with up-to-date information directly concerning native birds. BCCS also liaise with the Zoological Gardens, the Museum, the South Australian Ornithological Association and a number of veterinary surgeons who specialise in the treatment of birds.

The aims and objectives of the Bird Care and Conservation Society include:

To research the feeding, care and rehabilitation of birds.

To educate the public by all means possible concerning the care and conservation of birds, including the provision of an advisory service.

To provide, where possible, and work towards providing, care and housing for injured, sick, recuperating and homeless birds.

To support all measures which retain and maintain the natural habitat of birds and to promote the restoration of their habitat. When disturbance of their habitat is inevitable or necessary, to support either the rehabilitation of the area to its natural condition after the disturbance or the provision of conditions which allow the coexistence of the disturbing feature and the bird population, depending on the nature of the disturbance.

To support all measures which attempt to eradicate introduced pests, which disrupt the habitat and /or ecology of birds, but only in ways, which are ecologically sound and not unnecessarily cruel.

To support, in the case of native birds themselves being classed as pests, research into non-destructive methods of control.

To promote and support research and/or breeding programmes where the knowledge gained is considered to promote the welfare of birds.

To lobby for legislation prohibiting the taking of any wild native bird for any other purpose than breeding programmes or research.

To lobby the government to improve the policing of current laws protecting birds and their habitat and to lobby for changes in the laws when they are deemed to be contrary to the welfare of the birds concerned.

To campaign against the sport of hunting birds.

To improve conditions for and eradicate cruelty to birds used for commercial purposes.
